



Rector's Rambles

How are you, really?

This is a question you might have seen in the poster we prepared (with Iver parish) for our Wellbeing Coffee Mornings. "How are you, really?"

We've now had two of these coffee mornings and they have been extremely enjoyable and it's been good to meet

people who come to help and people who have come for the first time.



I used this as the heading for my ramble because as I write this I'm preparing a sermon based on 2 Timothy chapters 3 and 4. In this letter, for the only time, St Paul sounds tired and demoralised. He asks his younger colleague Timothy to "Do your best to come to me before winter." This was possibly because in the 1st Century, winter travel was far more arduous than at other times, it could also be that Paul didn't want to face winter without seeing Timothy.

The onset of winter can be quite demoralising, can't it? Quite apart from the weather, there are the fluctuating (and rising) covid numbers. At the end of a tough year, many of us might feel our reserves of strength, of patience, of caring, are severely depleted. And yet there is little sign of the pressure abating.

Don't try to work through this on your own. Look beyond yourself for support to boost yourself.

Reach out to other people. I am quite sure that in boosting yourself by reaching out, you provide a boost to those with whom you interact. I for one have always been uplifted when I've come away from a meeting with someone else.

Reach out to God. While I quoted a tired and demoralised St Paul earlier, his faith was not compromised. This was the same man who wrote (in the same letter) "I know the one in whom I have put my trust". In the last months of his life, in the face of execution, Paul did not deny his weariness, but he did not lose his trust in God.

We are in this life and in the church as individuals, but not alone. Along with others, fight the good fight, run the race, keep the faith.

Some of us in St Mary's have been sharing stories of what we have done to change in the past five or so years. I'd like to share some of them with you. Save Water!



The Dishwasher

Several people are using the dishwasher less often. I always find it interesting that more water is saved by using a dishwasher than by washing up in a bowl. I suppose with both systems it depends on how often you wash up. I do washing up the old fashioned way and have to use my willpower to stop myself washing up after every meal!

The Shower

We shared lots of stories of how younger people shower more often and for a longer period. Perhaps we were just making ourselves feel good! But it is true that limiting the length of time you shower is a good idea. I reckon on 4 minutes and just a little while longer to wash my hair. It is also a very good idea to shower instead of having a bath. Watching all that water going down the plug hole is a reminder of

We had all become more aware about insulating our lofts and, where possible, having cavity wall insulation. Of course, fleecy blankets and hot water bottles do wonders!

Energy – our energy

Most people were walking more than they used to but no one said they were riding a bike! One of our regular congregation members always comes on a bike, however. We are all noticing more and more people buying electric cars — I wonder who will be the first to buy an electric car in St Mary's?



Food

A few people were eating far less meat. We hear a lot that this is good for your health and for the planet.

Admirably, some people were growing their own food! How wonderful! The taste is so good when foods are home grown. We have even had people bringing their surplus produce to church to share out!

Of course, all of us are recycling more and more, using charity shops to buy and to donate to, wearing clothes for longer without washing them and much more..... how about sharing your experiences?

The United Nations Climate Change Conference - in other words COP 26. COP 26 is what we have all got used to calling this great meeting of minds but what a strange acronym it is. When I first heard it I thought it was something to do with an American crime drama. I just could not make it fit Climate Change Conference. I then googled it and discovered it stands for *Conference of Parties*. Even more mysterious! The parties are the people who signed a United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) way back in 1994. It is called COP 26 because this is the 26th summit meeting the Conference of Parties has held. Imagine that – they have been talking about climate change for this long and yet the world is still in big trouble.

The other surprising thing I learnt when I googled COP 26 was that the hosting of this year's conference is being shared between the United Kingdom and Italy. I had simply not realised this. By the time you are reading your church magazine the COP 26 meeting will have started and may even be over – I wonder if Italy will have been given some credit for the meeting by then?

This is a huge event for Glasgow to be hosting. By far the biggest international meeting held in the UK. I hope it will be as successful and significant at the COP 21 meeting held in Paris in 2015. This was when the world really began to understand the significance of climate change and agreed to limit the rise in temperatures to under 2 degrees C.

As we know, there is some doubt that this is enough or that it will be achieved. I hope and pray that at Cop 26 urgent action will be taken, help given to all nations to enable them to contribute to the action and words will be kept.

Whatever happens COP 26 will bring change for us all.


Christmas Gifts for SHOC (Slough Homeless Our Concern)

Treasurer's Corner.


The results of the third quarter ended 30th September 2021 showed that income was some £2800 up on the previous quarter, mainly due to fund raising of £1.800 from the Community Fayre, where many people from all sections of the community enjoyed a rainy, sunny afternoon.



Also the church received a donation of £1,000 during the following month.

Expenditure during the quarter was considerably down due to much reduced activity. The previous quarter had the Insurance Premiums paid for both Church and Hall (£2,400). The Church continued to control many areas of expenditure where possible. **Brian Edwards**

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
